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WEDNESDAY, May 20th, at 2 p.m., Fire Hall

Dr. Dan Conlin, a Curator at the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic grew up in the Valley Town of Berwick wondering about a large derelict building standing there. It was the local apple evaporator, and in time, as a researcher and scholar, he did a case study on it. He discovered that beginning in the 1890's and extending into the 1940's each Valley town had as its chief industrial enterprise "the Evaporator". He has developed a talk out of his research and has agreed to speak to us about the "Apple Evaporators of the Annapolis Valley".

WEDNESDAY, June 17th, at 2 p.m., Fire Hall

A Wolfville Historical Society member, Phyllis Westbury, will tell us about the "Passage Project" upon which she and other members are spending many hours, and which our Society supports with some of our money. Her illustrated talk will focus on individual artifacts in our Museum which are interesting and perhaps unique, and on all the work that goes into making a wider public aware and appreciative of them. This will be the final meeting in our Spring Series.

It is a Ballantine paperback written by Alfred Silver and published in 1996, with the stark title *ACADIA*. It tells the story of the great struggle between Charles LaTour and his rival d'Aulnay for supremacy in Acadia through the middle years of the 17th Century. Probably you remember the bare-bones story from your Grade 4 or 5 history lessons. Silver puts flesh on the bones with great skill. It is

unfortunate that his novel is not (apparently) available in a full-sized hard-cover edition.

Some History of Hydroelectric Power in Nova Scotia

- 1887 A small hydroelectric plant established at the head of Halifax's NW Arm
- 1891 Acadia Electric Light Company, Wolfville (coal & oil) 0.05 MW
- 1903 First significant hydroelectric plant in Nova Scotia built by mining interests on the Liscomb River
- 1919 Nova Scotia Power Commission (NSPC) formed by the government
- 1920 Gaspereau River Light, Heat and Power Company (R.A. Jodrey, C.H. Wright)
- 1920 St. Margaret's Bay hydro plants began to be built (NSPC)
- 1921 Avon River Power Company formed (W.H. Chase, RAJ, CHW), construction of Avon unit #1 began in 1922.
- 1926 ARP absorbed GRLHP
- 1927 Minas Basin Pulp & Paper Mills Company formed (RAJ, CHW, T.B. Akin)
- 1927 ARP acquired water rights for the Black River, and under RAJ's direction began building Hell's Gate unit #1.
- 1928 NSPC began hydro development on the Mersey River
- 1928 Nova Scotia Tramways & Power Company became Nova Scotia Light & Power Company
- 1928 ARP constructing Falls Lake dam and Avon unit #2
- 1929 ARP sold to I.W. Killam's NSLP

- 1933 MBP&PM begins building Lower St. Croix plant
- 1934 Minas Basin Pulp & Power Company (name change)
- 1936 MBP&P begins building Upper St. Croix plant
- 1951 ARP absorbed into NSLP
- 1972 NSLP expropriated by the NSPC, which became the NS Power Corporation in 1973.
- 1992 NSPC became Nova Scotia Power Inc., a private company
- 1994 Stiver's Falls dam replaced
- 1997 Falls Lake dam replaced
- 1998 Emera formed as holding company that included NSPI
