THE GREAT WAR PROJECT

1914: WAR COMES TO WOLFVILLE

As far back as the Fall of 2012, our Ad Hoc Committee, which was brought together to develop new paths for the Society, began to sketch out an idea for the summer of 2014: a commemoration of the outbreak of the Great War one hundred years before. The Great War Project has been mentioned in previous newsletters, but only briefly, because our Great War Committee was only just beginning to meet and brainstorm and plan. We are now ready to share with members the plans that have been so far developed. Here is a summary -- an outline developed to accompany our discussions with participating organisations.

'1914: WAR COMES TO WOLFVILLE'

a Commemoration Project for the Town of Wolfville and area co-ordinated by the Wolfville Historical Society

BACKGROUND

The Great War with all its battlefield sacrifice will be commemorated in many ways in 2014. Rather than recalling the horrors of the trenches, the Wolfville Historical Society is developing a plan to commemorate the part played during the war on the home front, in this part of the Annapolis Valley, Nova Scotia.

THE PROJECT

The far-away war had a major effect on the lives of people in our area. Although there was no compulsory conscription, men flocked to enlist when war broke out. As a result, the Valley's farms and apple factories and its many retail businesses lost their employees. Acadia University's young men also left for the army and the front: one of them earned the Victoria Cross 'for valour'. Many young women also enlisted as nurses, and those who stayed often had to take the place of men in many areas of the economy. Last summer, a special research assistant was tasked by the Wolfville Historical Society to go through the local newspapers of the day, to see how area residents received news of the War and how they responded.

The Society is now developing a plan to bring local organizations together to create a summer of activities and events to recall the effects of the war in this peaceful Valley. There has been an initial meeting with the Mayor of Wolfville, who has reacted positively to the plan, and suggested the Town might fund a comprehensive brochure. Contacts have been developed with the local branch of the Royal Canadian Legion; with the Wolfville Fire Department; with the Wolfville Business Development Corporation; with the History Department, Art Gallery and Archives of Acadia University; with the Women's Institutes of Port Williams and Grand Pre (both founded in 1913); with a Battle Reenactment group in Halifax; with the Canadian Red Cross; and with at least one retail store-owner, who has already offered part of her store window for appropriate displays.

The Society's Curator, Alexandra Hernould, is planning a special exhibit on the Great War as part of the annual season at Randall House. A call has already gone out for artefacts from that period, and inviting local residents with memories passed on from the War period to be interviewed on video as part of the exhibit. These interviews have now begun.

PLANS FOR THE SUMMER'S ACTIVITIES INCLUDE:

- 1. The opening of Randall House, May 31
- 2. Celebration of Canadian History Week July 1-7 with:
 - i) The opening of the Great War Exhibit at Randall House

- ii) Showing of films of the period
- iii) A reading of poetry and prose from WW1.
- iv) Talk about the lead-up to the War
- 3. Canada Day marked with old Dominion Day posters.
- 4. 'Pop-up' exhibits displayed at major town locations (post office, firehall, train station etc.) detailing the part played by these institutions during the war.
- 5. Regular bulletins of world news documenting the approach of War to be set up in locations around town perhaps in store windows reproducing news reports of the day, as well as advertisements from local businesses.
- 6. Special events marking Canada's entry into the war August 5th.

These plans are still being developed, and the Society is researching sources of funding for their implementation. Incidentally, we are grateful to the Tartan Foundation for their most generous recent gift of \$3,500 to the Society. And, as always, we thank the Town of Wolfville for their continued support.

SUMMARY

The Wolfville Historical Society believes that these events can do a lot to inform local residents of a part of their history which is in danger of being forgotten, especially among the younger generation. But they also believe that, properly marketed and publicised, the season of events and activities will attract and engage visitors to the Town and area, and provide an opportunity for many different local organizations to work together in the creation of a unique display of the Town's historical identity, and the part it played at a significant moment in world history.
